

Education is vital for escaping poverty, but many students face challenges. In Davidson, Hickman, Houston and Robertson counties, 75% of third graders don't read at grade level. Kids entering kindergarten without basic literacy skills are three to four times more likely to drop out later.

WE ARE HERE ...

> TO PREPARE STUDENTS FOR KINDERGARTEN

Early brain development fosters lifelong learning. We support this through Imagination Library for book access, Childcare Nashville for quality child care and pre-K programs, and Read to Succeed for educator training to enhance early childhood education.

> TO IMPROVE LITERACY RATES

If kids aren't reading at grade level by third grade, they're likely to struggle across subjects and fall behind. Raising Readers Nashville boosts third-grade reading proficiency through quality early learning, combating absenteeism, addressing summer learning loss and providing classroom book access.

> TO MAKE SURE KIDS GRADUATE

We're partnering with agencies to ensure every student receives support to graduate and plan for their future. This includes promoting social and emotional education, offering mentorship and family guidance, and providing personalized tutoring through Raise Your Hand.

> TO EQUIP INDIVIDUALS FOR BETTER OPPORTUNITIES

To escape poverty, individuals require better-paying jobs and opportunities for advancement, which necessitate postsecondary education, training or certification. Our SNAP Employment and Training, in collaboration with partner agencies, empowers individuals to attain the education and skills necessary for sustainable wages, paving the way for a financially stable future.

> TO MAKE SURE OUR NEIGHBORS KEEP MORE OF WHAT THEY EARN

A startling number of Americans find themselves on the precipice of financial ruin with no emergency savings to cushion the fall. We are tackling this vulnerability head-on through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) free tax-prep program. By putting money back into the hands of our neighbors, this program serves as a lifeline, preventing one-off financial setbacks from cascading into a cycle of debt, poverty or even homelessness.

> TO HELP FAMILIES INCREASE THEIR SAVINGS

Individualized counseling at the Financial Empowerment Center aids those facing financial challenges in achieving greater stability. Professionally trained counselors assist clients in managing debt, enhancing credit, budgeting, establishing bank accounts and saving for the future, all at zero cost.

Too many of our most underserved neighbors struggle to access quality health care, supportive services and a strong community network. In fact, Tennessee ranks 40th out of 50 states for overall health – and roughly 10 percent of our population is uninsured.

> TO ASSIST THOSE SUFFERING FROM MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES AND CHRONIC DISEASE

Living with chronic disease, mental health issues and addiction is a daily challenge for many. Our partner agencies equip clients with education and resources to manage their conditions for healthier lives. The Williamson Prevention Coalition and Robertson County Prevention Coalition collaborate to prevent teen substance abuse, fostering partnerships for a drug-free community.

> TO BUILD STRONG, SUPPORTIVE NEIGHBORHOODS

We foster community bonds through Family Resource Centers, senior meal delivery and teen outreach programs, helping neighbors forge lasting connections. A supportive community enhances learning for children, improves quality of life for adults and significantly impacts isolated seniors.

WE ARE HERE ...

> TO MOVE FAMILIES OUT OF HOMELESSNESS

Through The Family Collective, we swiftly move homeless families into stable housing and prevent future homelessness. Overcoming financial barriers like security deposits and first month's rent is crucial. Our network of coaches assists families in securing housing and planning for long-term stability through employment and financial coaching.

> TO MAKE SURE NO ONE GOES HUNGRY

Our partner agencies, including food banks and meal providers, ensure access to nutritious meals for our neighbors. We collaborate with the community to offer food pantries and support children with meals outside of school hours.

> IN TIMES OF CRISIS

Our 211 Helpline is available in times of crisis. We are here to help avoid foreclosure, utility cutoffs or repossession. We pool funds from various sources to help make rent or mortgage payments, pay outstanding utility bills, and provide relief from natural disasters like floods or tornadoes.
